Notes/other:

Biographical/Historical Sketch:

Paul William Price was a percussionist, composer, conductor, publisher of percussion music, and music educator. Price was born on May 15, 1921 in Fitchburg, Massachusetts. He attended the New England Conservatory of Music and earned his diploma in 1942. Afterwards, he spent four years in the U.S. Army. From 1946 to 1949 Price was the first percussionist and xylophone soloist in Frank Simon's Band. During this period he attended the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, where he studied under George Carey and Fred Noak. He earned his Bachelor of Music degree in 1948 and his Master of Music degree in 1949.

From 1949 to 1956 Price taught percussion at University of Illinois, where he established the first accredited college percussion ensemble course in 1950. In 1955, Price moved East. He performed, conducted, and published music while teaching at Boston University, Ithaca College, and Newark State College. From 1957 to 1986 he held a teaching position at Manhattan School of Music.

Price wrote percussion compositions and authored two textbooks on percussion methodology: “Beginning Snare Drum Method” and “Techniques for Playing Triangle, Tambourine, and Castagnettes.” A lecturer, reviewer, and author of journal articles, in the mid-1960s Price began independently publishing percussion music under his two companies, Music for Percussion and Paul Price Publications.

In 1975 he was inducted to the Percussive Arts Society’s Hall of Fame. Two years later Price received a citation from the National Association of American Composers and Conductors for “outstanding contribution to American music.” Price’s work influenced both the literature and performance practices of percussion ensembles. He died on July 10, 1986.

Scope and Content:

The Paul Price Collection consists of items related to the career of Paul Price. The collection is arranged alphabetically, and then chronologically. Included are materials on Price's pedagogy, publicity and tour materials for the American Youth Symphony Orchestra and the Manhattan Percussion Ensemble, news clippings and articles, performance programs, and correspondence. The collection also contains a card catalog of percussion music and eight scrapbooks documenting Price's career from 1947 to 1981. Items in the scrapbooks include materials on performances, programs, news clippings, letters, flyers, announcements, and European tourism pamphlets. The scrapbooks are stored separately from the other manuscript and visual materials and are restricted to staff use only.
